Celebrating the Jubilee Year of Hope and Reverse Advent Appeal as "Pilgrims of Hope with kind hearts and a hunger for justice"

Last Friday morning, we were privileged to join Catholic schools across the Diocese for the live-streamed celebration marking the Jubilee Year of Hope. A Jubilee Year, which occurs every 25 years, is a special time for prayer, reflection, and renewal.

Throughout this year, our school community has embraced this spirit through meaningful activities, including our Pilgrimage Walk in July and the Reverse Advent Calendar initiative. Thanks to your incredible generosity, we have already collected over 500 item and Advent hasn't even begun!

Items for the Homeless in Birmingham need to be brought in by Monday 8th December while items for Fr Hudson's Care need to be brought in by Wednesday 17th December. You are welcome to send in items from other Year Groups if you prefer. Some students have asked if they can donate money so we have set up a Reverse Advent Calendar link on Arbor and we will use the money to buy items for your child's year group.

Thank you for continuing to make a difference in the lives of others through your kindness and compassion.

The live-stream celebration reminded us of the importance of putting our faith into action, grounded in the belief that every person is made in the image and likeness of God and deserves love and care. After the service, a Year 7 focus group reflected on this message, sharing how they understood the significance of donating food, toiletries, and clothing to support those experiencing poverty, homelessness, and seeking asylum.

News from the Computing Department




All the computing students have taken part in the annual Bebras Challenge which is run in collaboration with the Raspberry Pi Foundation.

The Bebras Challenge introduces computational thinking to students worldwide. This exciting challenge took place in school. Annually, over 3 million students from more than 80 countries participate!

Each participant had 45 minutes to tackle a series of interactive tasks, designed to encourage logical thinking and problem-solving skills appropriate for their age group. The tasks are designed to allow every student the opportunity to showcase their potential, and every participant receives a certificate.

Certificates and subsequent awards will be available in a few weeks. We look forward to celebrating all levels of success with the students.

Criminology

British Library Trip



On Tuesday 18th November, Miss Arnott, Ms Harkness and I took 24 of our highest achieving and most enthusiastic Year 11 English students to the British Library in London for the day, to see if we could tempt them into opting for A Level English Language or Literature next year. While we were there, we attended two A Level style workshops called 'Exploring Black British Literature' and 'Sounds Familiar: Exploring Speech, Accent and Dialect'.



Both sessions were really informative; students left with a huge list of Black British-authored novels for their "To Be Read" pile, and a greater understanding of how much accent and dialect can change depending on where we live. Some heated discussions were held over whether it should be pronounced 'bAHth' or 'bath', and whether PE shoes should be called pumps or plimsolls!



During our lunch break, we also got to explore the library's Treasures Gallery, and saw original versions of the Magna Carta, letters written by Jane Austen, Henry VIII's Bible, and many other fascinating pieces of literary history.

The students' behaviour was exemplary, and they had a fantastic time. I would like to take this time to thank them and their parents for getting them to school at the very early hour of 6:30am, and to Miss Arnott & Ms Harkness for their support with running the trip and giving up so much of their own time.

Bletchley Park Trip

The Mathematics Department chaperoned a wonderful trip to Bletchley Park with 50 Year 11 and Sixth Form students, who were an absolute credit to the school. They thoroughly enjoyed a guided tour and an engaging workshop where they explored the complexities of the Enigma machine and even had the chance to take photos with it.



The visit highlighted the vital role mathematicians at Bletchley Park played in cracking enemy codes, helping to shorten World War II. It also showcased the



significant contribution women made during the Second World War, with around 75% of Bletchley's workforce being female.

Students also gained insight into how the groundbreaking work at Bletchley paved the way for the development of GCHQ and the modern applications of mathematics in cryptography and cybersecurity.

Year 12 Debate Team news

Last week saw a successful win for our year 12 debate team. We took 7 students to the event, and the 3 debaters (Mollie Harris, Adrian Piekarski and Alex Kelly) were exceptionally persuasive in their arguments to ban long haul flights. The team and their supporters have worked hard to plan and perform this debate, and it paid off when they won this initial round and are now through to the next round of the prestigious MACE debates in January.

Winter Music Concert 2025


