## The PEGI rating system for games

As of last year, the PEGI rating system became official legislation in the rating of computer games, meaning that the old 'BBFC' ratings (as used in films) are no longer seen on games packaging—unless it is under more 'extreme' circumstances.

It is illegal for anyone below the PEGI rated age on the box to buy the game, but as before, it is still legal for an adult to purchase the game. This can create problems as many adults unknowingly buy age rated games for their children which shouldn't be seen by them.

Modern games like Grand Theft Auto 5 and Call of Duty: Black Ops 2 carry '18' PEGI ratings on them, the same as an 18 rated film on DVD or at the cinema.

Perhaps the ones you need to be most aware of are (look for these on the front of games software) -



This rating is applied once the depiction of violence (or sexual activity) reaches a stage that looks the same as would be expected in real life. More extreme bad language, the www.pegi.info concept of the use of tobacco and drugs and the depiction of criminal activities.



This adult classification is applied when the level of violence reaches a stage where it becomes a depiction of gross violence and/or includes elements of specific types of violence.

#### The Microsoft Family Safety tool

The Microsoft Family Safety tool has the following main functions -

- The Family Safety Filter. Software you install and set up on each computer your children use. It monitors your child using safety settings you select.
- The Family Safety website. Where you choose and manage all the settings for each family member and view their activity reports. You can create settings on the website once and then they'll apply to every computer you've installed the Family Safety Filter on.
- Windows Parental Controls. A feature
  in Windows that's turned on when you use
  Family Safety. You can use Windows Parental
  Controls to set up more safety settings for your
  child's computer.

#### **Protecting mobiles and tablets**

Protecting mobile phones and tablets can be a lot trickier. Being the device that is often out and about with children the most, it is perhaps the most important to protect. You could -

• Set up parental controls on your child's mobile. This can be done using one of the guides below but can also be done by following your manufacturer's manual, as it differs between Android, iPhones and other operating system. An example on how to do this on an Android phone can be found at-

Parental controls are also useful to prevent your child making **unwanted/expensive purchases** on their phone.

- Install software on your child's phone or tablet that can track their internet and filter out inappropriate sites. Software such as the 'Norton Parental Control Software' and 'K9 Web Protection' as listed on the left can also be installed on mobile phones to serve the same purpose. You can search through the Google Play Store or the Apple App Store for this software.
